University of Utah - Admission avg. 3.5+ GPA Suggest AP/IB/Concurrent Enrollment courses, academic achievements, intellectual pursuits and creative endeavors, extra-curricular activities, athletics, clubs, work experience, diversity, community involvement, personal achievements, ACT is optional utah.edu



USU - Admission 2.8 high school GPA, ACT scores are optional. Scholarships possible for those ranging from a combined 3.9 GPA & 18 ACT to 3.0 GPA & 32 ACT usu.edu



(9th grade required classes are 1.0 credit English 9, 1.0 credit Math, 1.0 credit Science, .5 credit World Geog., .5 credit World Civ., and .5 credit P.E. Some of these classes are not offered at the local high schools.)

Credit recovery can be done through your teachers (sometimes), CVJH Summer School, East Shore High School, BYU Independent Study, or a state approved competency testing center. There is a cost for most options. Contact your Counselor for more information.

11. Arena Scheduling – High School registration is this spring. Arena scheduling is a race to pick classes & begins at an exact day & time. Prepared students create better schedules. High School counselors will help by visiting your class in March. CVJH Counselors can help you plan and will be at school to assist during arena scheduling times.

10. Credit – .25 Credits are awarded for each D- grade or higher. Certain credits are required to earn certificates for completing Jr. High and H.S. Failing or taking fewer classes means you must make up credit in Summer School (9th-12th), East Shore High (9th-12th) or an approved school.

9. MTEC – Mountainland Technology College has certification programs for entry-level careers in health care, auto repair, computers, culinary arts, manufacturing, commercial truck driving, apprenticeships (HVAC, plumbing and electrician), and welding. Classes can be taken during H.S. for credit at a significant discount. mtec.edu

8. Financial Awareness - learn how to pay for your college education. The FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) can be filed fall of your senior year. Some students qualify for grants (free money) that are used to help pay for college. For more information see fafsa.gov

7. ACT - The American College Test measures your preparedness for college in math, English, science and reading. The ACT is required for college entrance to some colleges. It can be taken more than once, but is recommended during 11th or 12th grade.



6. Cumulative GPA - an avg. of grades earned throughout school. Divide total grade points by total classes (A = 4, B = 3, C = 2, D = 1 and add .3 for each + and subtract .3 for each -).

5. AP/Honors - advanced courses that may be taken in high school. Passing AP tests will give you college credit.

4. Concurrent Enrollment - an opportunity for high school students to earn college credit while in high school at a huge savings. Most classes count for both H.S. and college credit. For more information go to <https://www.uvu.edu/concurrent>

3. schools.shmoop.com/utah – a website designed to help Utah students prepare for the ACT, AP and other test. Free test preparation is available to all Utah students. Visit the above website, select your school, and make an account. The magic word is “HONEY” (all caps).

2. Scholarships - cash awards used to pay some or all tuition, book and other college costs. Grades, talents and leadership skills can qualify a student for scholarships. Use the local H.S. Counseling websites to view lists of available scholarships or ask your counselor. Many universities combine GPA & ACT scores into an index chart that they use to award academic merit scholarships.



1. Utah Opportunity Scholarship – This \$1000-\$4000 award is accepted at most Utah colleges and requires a 3.3 H.S. GPA and completion of 3 AP or Concurrent Enrollment courses (1 in each subject) in Math, Science & Language Arts, complete FAFSA – for details see ushe.edu/state-scholarships-aid
